

♥ SIXTH WEEK OF EASTER AND THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD

SUNDAY

Theophilus of Alexandria, Easter Letter (AD 401), 2

The Easter journey can be experienced as the preparation for a long-desired trip: we need to pick out the right clothes, check our state of health, get to know the places through maps or pictures, and still dream big. Our spiritual journey should also be similarly prepared: we need to abandon our garments of sin, recognize that we have been blessed, ponder over the Passion and the Resurrection, and hope in what we do not yet see.

MONDAY

Leo the Great, Sermon 16

Easter urges us to look to Christ, to lift up our hearts on

high without ever forgetting our brothers and sisters in need. Our conscience might be seemingly cleared by giving an extra piece of change while waiting at a traffic light, or feeling sad when we see some terrible news on television. We can start here, but the goal is total involvement and time spent out of love.

TUESDAY Chromatius of Aquileia, Sermon 15, 1

"Look to God that you may be radiant" (Ps 34:6), says the psalmist; look to Jesus and be irradiated by his

immense goodness and humility. He became like us so we could become like him! During a time that makes arrogance, personal glory, success, and image the most fundamental reasons for living, Christ, who makes himself a servant, vexes, disrupts, and often disturbs Christians themselves just as he "irritated" the disciples by washing their feet. Which model do we wish to follow?

WEDNESDAY

Leo the Great, Sermon 71 (58)

Those who have encountered Jesus Christ and his Church can fully welcome the gospel message or choose to travel other roads. It is in freedom that we are saved and in freedom itself that we are loved. If we fall in love during this encounter we will become new creatures, happy and excited to have abandoned our old ways and to live the present moment with the certainty of future goods.



SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION Leo the Great, Sermon 73, 2-4

We are made for heaven and cannot fly low our entire lives. The weight of sin holds us anchored to the ground, bound to ourselves and to material things, but God's love draws us toward him delicately and sweetly. He does not break down the door to our hearts because he has the key; but he wants us to rediscover the delight of opening ourselves from within and joyfully welcoming him.

THURSDAY

Augustine, On Faith, Hope and Love, 14, 53

We are the most well-to-do heirs: we are the favorite children of the merciful Father, witnesses to the Gospel

who, through the virtues and sufferings of Christ, walk in the world carrying our crosses. Renewed in Baptism and abandoning sin, we live as risen men and women passing through this world with our feet on the ground, our hands outstretched toward our neighbors, and our gaze set on heaven.

FRIDAY Gregory the Great, *Homilies*, 2, 29,

Jesus did not leave by ascending into heaven; in fact he still makes himself present today as he did then. He has shown us the way, the truth and the life,

and he has left the Church to be a guide and teacher. We meditate, pray, and act within the Church to prevent the Gospel from remaining just a book like any other — collecting dust on the shelves or sitting on the ambo — and to allow it to walk the streets of the world with our legs.

SATURDAY

Augustine, Sermon 263, 2

Thinking of heavenly things is the most sublime meditation for someone who has faith. It would be wonderful if at the end of our lives, ready and eager like young St. Dominic Savio before he took his last breath, we were able to say, "What a beautiful thing I see!" But God's wonders are already here on earth, among us and with us, so let us meditate upon what we expect to find in heaven while we are still on earth.
